RULES OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WORCESTER, MASSACHUSETTS

Rule 1. At all meetings of the City Council six (6) Councillors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Duties and Powers of the Chair

Rule 2. The Mayor shall take the chair at the hour to which the City Council has adjourned and call the members to order. In the absence of the Mayor, the Vice-Chairman of the City Council shall preside and, in the absence of both, the most senior member with continuous service of the City Council shall serve during the absence of both the Mayor and Vice-Chairman.

Rule 3. The Mayor shall preserve decorum and order, may speak to points of order, in preference to other members; shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the City Council; and no other business shall be in order till the question on the appeal shall have been decided. The question shall be put as follows: "Shall the decision of the chair stand as the judgement of the City Council?". The vote shall be by roll call, and it shall be decided in the affirmative unless a majority of the votes are to the contrary.

Rule 4. The Mayor shall declare all votes. If any member doubts the vote, the chair, without further debate upon the question, shall require the Clerk to call the roll of affirmative and negative votes and the chair shall declare the results; but no such declaration shall be made unless a quorum of the City Council has voted.

Rule 5. All final votes of the City Council on questions involving the expenditure of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or more, or upon the request of any member, shall be by roll call and the yeas and nays shall be entered on the records.

Rule 6. When an order or resolution relates to a subject which may properly be examined and reported upon by a standing committee of the City Council, such order or resolution shall upon presentation be referred to such committee. All petitions, remonstrances, memorials, communications or any matter before the City Council may be referred as follows:

1. To a standing committee of the City Council.

2. To a special committee of the City Council.

3. To the City Manager.

4. To any department or department head, or any person, group or organization to whom referral is permitted, authorized or allowed under the provisions of the Plan E Charter, the Worcester Home Rule Charter and under applicable provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws.

Rule 7. That all matters referred to the City Solicitor and the Law Department be reported back to the City Council within sixty (60) days.

Rule 8. The chair shall put all questions in the order in which they are moved, unless the subsequent motion be previous in its nature, except that in naming sums and fixing times, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

After a motion has been put by the chair, it shall not be withdrawn, except by unanimous consent.

Rule 9. When a question is under debate the chair shall receive no motion, but

To adjourn

To lay on the table

For the previous question

To postpone to a certain day

To refer

To amend

To postpone indefinitely which several motions shall have precedence in the above order. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of an ordinance shall be equivalent to a motion to postpone indefinitely. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, except upon immediate repetition, and that motion, the motion to lay on the table, the motion to take from the table, and the motion for a previous question shall be decided without debate.

Rule 10. The previous question shall be put in the following form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and all further amendments or debates of the main question shall be suspended until the previous question is decided.

Rule 11. When two or more members at the same time indicate their desire to take the floor, the chair shall name the member who is entitled to the floor.

Rule 12. When two or more members at the same time indicate their desire to take the floor, the chair shall give preference to that member who has not as yet spoken on the subject under discussion.

Rule 13. That amendments to proposed orders, resolutions, petitions, and ordinances which are already in writing, shall be reduced to writing before being proposed and shall be given to the Clerk of the moment, in written form, before being considered by the City Council.

Rights and Duties of Members

Rule 14. Every member, when about to speak shall rise and respectfully address the chair, and wait to be recognized; shall confine himself or herself to the question under debate and avoid personalities and speak for no more than five minutes except with consent of the Council the first time he or she rises, and that each time thereafter he or she rises to address the same issue, that he or she speak for no more than five minutes.

When speaking, voting, calling the roll, and announcing votes, all members of the City Council, the City Manager, the City Clerk, department heads or members of the public shall use a microphone.

Rule 15. No member speaking shall be interrupted by another, but by rising to raise a question of order.

Rule 16. No member shall vote on any question, or serve on any committee where his or her private interest is immediately concerned distinct from that of the public.

When considering an item properly before the City Council, if the filer states his or her intention to have that item referred to a standing committee of the City Council, the City Manager, or other appropriate individual or body, the first time he or she rises to speak to that item, he or she will be allowed to speak to that item as permitted by the Rules of the City Council. No other debate will be allowed except to oppose or amend the referral or to request clarification of the item. At the time of filing, a petitioner shall include in their written request, their intention to have such item considered by a specific standing committee.

Rule 17. Every member present when a question is put shall vote unless the City Council for special reasons excuses him or her. Application to be so excused on any question must be made before the City Council has decided, or before the calling of the yeas and nays; and such application shall be accompanied by a brief statement of the reasons and shall be decided without debate.

Rule 18. A motion to reconsider may be made by filing written notice of such motion with the City Clerk within forty-eight hours, Saturday and Sunday to be excluded in the computation of the forty-eight (48) hours, but no more than one motion for reconsideration of any vote shall be entertained.

Rule 19. Motion duly made, and on vote of 2/3 of all the members of the City Council, the City Council may at any meeting at which action is taken move to reconsider the action so taken. After reconsideration of the aforesaid no further reconsideration shall be entertained.

Regular Meetings

Rule 20. Regular meetings of the City Council shall be held weekly on Tuesday evenings at 7:00 o'clock p.m. unless at a previous meeting, by a majority vote, the City Council determines another day, time and/or place. They shall be held in the Council Chamber. If agreed to by a majority of

During the months of July and August, the City Council shall hold at least one regular meeting each month.

Special Meetings

Rule 21. The Mayor, or Vice-Chairman of the City Council, or any five members thereof, may call a special or emergency meeting by causing written notices at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance, stating the time and purpose of holding such meetings and signed by the person or persons calling the same, to be delivered in hand to each member of the City Council, or left at his or her usual dwelling place, at least twelve hours before the time of such meeting. In the case of an emergency meeting, the Mayor may waive the twelve hour notice.

Meetings of the City Council may also be held at any time when all members of the City Council are present and consent thereto. (G.L.,c,43,s.98)

Rule 22. An item not on the calendar of a regular or special meeting shall not be considered nor acted upon unless two-thirds of all the members of the Council consent thereto. Except, if such item is an ordinance, order, or resolution, it may not be

passed through all its stages at that meeting if any member objects. Any person who has more than one petition listed on the calendar of the City Council at any one meeting, may speak for no more than ten minutes collectively.

Order of Business

Rule 23. At every regular meeting of this City Council the order of business shall be as follows:

- 1. Invocation
- 2. Pledge of Allegiance/Star Spangled Banner
 - 3. Roll Call
 - 4. Public Hearing
 - 5. Motion of Reconsideration
 - 6. Items of Citizen Interest
- 7. Items of Departmental or Employee Interest
- 8. All petitions filed with the City Council will be referred to their proper committee, commission, department or to the City Manager for notification, investigation or disposition without debate except questions of the City Council members: provided, however, in the event the rules are suspended only the petitioner may be heard for a period not to exceed five (5) minutes; and upon report to the City Council of such referred petitions, a full discussion and debate be allowed by members of the Council and interested members of the

public before final action by the Council is taken. No more than five (5) minutes is to be allowed any person addressing the Council on such petitions.

- 9. Communications from the City Manager 10. Motions, Orders, or Resolutions
- 11. Recess to Finance Committee to take up matters before said Committee, and no action is to be taken on recommendations or action taken by the said Committee on Finance and Ordinance until the next regular meeting of the City Council.

Citizens and employees of the City shall have a reasonable opportunity to be heard at any meeting of the Finance Committee in regard to any matter considered thereat: providing that the Chairman or the Finance Committee shall terminate such participation after expiration of five (5) minutes and shall terminate when such participants departs from the subject matter being considered, or in his or her presentation conducts himself or herself in a manner other than is reasonable and proper in the presentation of the subject to the Finance Committee. 12. Recess to Ordinance Committee, if necessary.

- 13. Communications and Reports from City Officers
- 14. Reports of Committees.
- 15. Unfinished business of preceding meetings.

Rule 24. The seats of the members of the City Council shall be numbered, and determined by lot; and no member shall change his or her seat but by permission of the chair.

Communications and Committees

Rule 25. All petitions, memorials or remonstrances addressed to the City Council shall be filed with the City Clerk and presented by the chair or by a member in his place who may explain the subject thereof.

No petition, remonstrance, resolution or other communication, submitted by any improvement association, civic society, club or other unincorporated organization, or its officers, shall be considered by the City Council or printed in its proceedings unless such organization shall have filed with the City Clerk a statement sworn to by one of its officers, specifying the number of members in good standing, the time and place of meeting and a list of the officers for the current year.

No petition, remonstrance, resolution or other communication which deals with personalities or with matters not within the general supervision of government shall be considered by the City Council. The City Clerk, with the assistance of the City Solicitor, shall determine when an item is not appropriate for placement on the City Council agenda.

Rule 26. No action shall be taken by the City Council, or one of its committees on any petition unless the principal petitioner on any petition before the City Council or any of its committees shall be notified that his or her petition is to be heard and/or final action is to be taken by the City Council.

Rule 27. All papers of whatever description which may require action by the City Council, shall be presented to the City Clerk not later than 4:15 p.m. on the Thursday preceding the day of each regular meeting. Papers presented after that hour on such day will not be considered until the next meeting.

The City Manager's recommendations and reports including pertinent data relating to the same, shall be presented to the City Clerk not later than 4:00 p.m. on the Friday preceding the day of each regular meeting. Papers, excluding emergency items, presented after that hour on such day will not be considered until the next meeting.

That prior to confirmation of appointments by the City Manager that those individuals nominated must first appear prior to or on the evening of the date appointed.

Rule 28. The City Clerk shall prepare a list of all matters to come before the City Council and the Committee on Finance and Ordinances at each meeting in accordance with the established order of business and shall cause to be delivered to the residence of each Councillor a copy of the same not later than 7:00 p.m. the Friday evening preceding a Tuesday meeting. Copies of these lists shall be available to the public at each meeting.

A petition, resolution, order, remonstrance, memorial, communication or other matter acted upon unfavorably by the Council including placing on file such petition, resolution, order, remonstrance, memorial, communication or other matter or the substance thereof shall not again be docketed on the Council Calendar for consideration by the Council within a period of 3 months of such unfavorable action unless previously authorized by a 2/3 vote of the Council.

Rule 29. The City Clerk is authorized by these rules to order and publish notice of hearings on petitions presented to the City Clerk requiring public hearings before the Council.

Rule 30. A petition for annuity to be paid under Section 89 of Chapter 32 of the General Laws shall be placed on file unless it shall be accompanied by a medical certificate, certifying that the death of the applicant's husband was casually related to his employment in the Police or Fire Department of the City of Worcester.

A petition for annuity to be paid under Section 89 of Chapter 32 of the General Laws shall be placed on file if it is received within six months after a petition for an annuity to be paid to the same persons has been denied by the City Council or within six months after a board of physicians created under the provisions of said Section 89 of Chapter 43 of the General Laws has refused to issue to the City Treasurer the certificate required by said section.

A petition for increase of pension under the provisions of Section 90A of Chapter 32 of the General Laws shall be placed on file if it is not accompanied by a medical certificate certifying that the disability of the petitioner at the time of retirement was casually related to his or her employment as an employee of the City of Worcester.

A petition for increase of pension under the provisions of Section 90A of Chapter 32 of the General Laws shall be placed on file if it is received within two years after a petition for increase of pension to be paid the same person has been denied by the City Council.

Rule 31. There shall be appointed standing committees of the City Council as follows:

1. Committee on Commerce and Development, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to Commerce, Industry, Labor, Urban Renewal, Development and Planning.

Committee on Community Development, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all aspects of Community Development Block Grant

funding.

3. Committee on Education to consist of three (3) Councillors to consider all matters pertaining to public vocational education, public education as offered by the City of Worcester or it's departments, and the public libraries.

4. Committee on Elder Affairs, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to the problems of the elderly citizens.

- 5. Committee on Ethnic and Minority Affairs, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to ethnic and minority affairs, youth, human resources, handicapped, personnel policies, employee training and problems facing groups not otherwise represented in a Rule 31 Committee.
- 6. Committee on Fees and Charges, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to periodically review the Fees and Charges assessed by city departments.
- 7. Committee on Finance, to consist of the Mayor and ten (10) Councillors, to consider all matters of appropriations and loans, and in general any matters affecting the financial interests of the city; to consider all official bonds.

8. Committee on Health, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider, all matters relating to health care, public health and hospitals.

9. Committee on Housing, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters relating to

housing.

10. Committee on Land Use, to consist of three (3) Councillors to consider all matters involving the acquisition and preservation of open

space.

11. Committee on Legislative Affairs, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to legislation affecting Worcester-said Committee to meet periodically with elected members of the General Court so that the city can lobby for or against pending legislation that would have an impact on the community.

12. Committee on Military Affairs and Veterans' Service, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to veterans organziations and veterans in general and military

affairs.

13. Committee on Municipal Operations, to consist of three (3) Councillors to consider all matters involving problems in municipal operations, procedures and insurance.

14. Committee on Ordinances, to consist of

the Mayor and (10) Councillors.

15. Committee on Parks and Recreation, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to the parks, playgrounds, recreational activities and Hope Cemetery.

16. Committee on Public Safety, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to police, fire and public health, as it in-

volves the public safety.

17. Committee on Public Service and Transportation, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all complaints that may be sent to the City Council against public service corporations and to consider all matters affecting lighting system and transportation.

18. Committee on Public Works, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to streets, water, sewers, public buildings,

engineering and energy.

19. Committee on Rules and Regulations, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to periodically review the rules and regulations of the City Council.

20. Committee on Traffic and Parking, to consist of three (3) Councillors, to consider all matters pertaining to traffic conditions.

All Committees of this Council shall be ap-

pointed by the Mayor.

"A reasonable good faith effort should be made to notify the principal petitioner of any item to be heard before a Standing Committee of the City Council of the date, time and place at which his or her petition will be heard by the Committee." All Standing Committees of the City Council shall have general budget and policy oversight relationships with City Departments as listed.

No petition may be voted by a Standing Committee of the City Council unless the principal petitioner has been notified as specified above. That all petitions which are routinely referred to a proper Standing Committee of the City Council shall be heard within a reasonable period of time, said time to be determined by the Chairman and members of said Committee.

In meetings of the Committee on Finance and Ordinance:

When a question is under debate the chair shall receive no motion, but

To adjourn

To lay on the table

For the previous question

To postpone to a certain day

To refer

To amend

To postpone indefinitely

which several motions shall have precedence on the above order. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of an ordinance shall be equivalent to a motion to postpone indefinitely. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, except upon immediate repetition and that motion, the motion to lay on the table, the motion to take from the table and the motion for a previous question shall be decided without debate.

The previous question shall be put in the following form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and all further amendments or debates or the main question shall be suspended until the previous question is decided.

The City Council shall refrain from authorizing the establishment of ad hoc committees except in those instances when an item -

a. cannot be considered by an existing Rule 31 Committee.

b. is limited in the scope of responsibilities to a narrow/single area of responsibility,

c. is limited in time and is established to exist for a specific period of time.

If such an ad hoc committee is established, it shall have a clearly defined purpose and have

a date established at which time it will automatically be dissolved unless re-established by a vote of the City Council.

If no such date has been established, the Ad Hoc Committee will be automatically dissolved at the end of the current term of Office of the City Council which established the Ad Hoc Committee.

Rule 32. Notice of all committee meetings must be given at least forty-eight (48) hours before the time for meeting, but meetings may be held at any time by unanimous consent of all the members of the committee, and a voting quorum must consist of a majority of the committee members.

Rule 33. All reports and papers submitted to the City Council shall be legibly written. The City Clerk or an assistant shall make copies of any papers to be reported by the Committee, at the request of the chairman thereof. Reports of all Committees whether by ordinance, resolution or otherwise, shall be made to the City Council, and no report shall be received unless agreed to in committee actually assembled.

Rule 34. The Mayor shall be ex-officio chairman of any committee of which he or she is a member, and on all other committees the Councillor first named shall be chairman, and in case of his or her resignation, or inability to serve, the

member of the committee next in order shall be chairman.

Member's Lobby

Rule 35. No person will be admitted within the rail in the City Council Chamber at any meeting of the City Council, except upon permission of the Mayor.

Smoking shall not be allowed at meetings of the City Council or at Committee Meetings of the City Council. The City Manager shall designated areas appropriate for smoking in all City of Worcester public buildings.

Hearings

Rule 36. The time devoted to public hearings at any meeting of the City Council shall not be more than two (2) hours at any one sitting. Any hearing not completed within the specified time may be continued to another meeting. Any individual, except attorneys at law, appearing before the City Council at a public hearing and claiming to represent another as agent or otherwise in the matter being heard shall file with the City Council a written authorization signed by the individual, organization or corporation whose interests such individual represents. Five (5) minutes shall be allowed each speaker to express his or her views on the matter being heard by the City Council.

Ordinances, Orders, etc.

Rule 37. All by-laws passed by the City Council shall be termed ordinances, and the enacting style shall be, "Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Worcester". In all votes by which the City Council expresses anything by order or command, the form of expression shall be, "Ordered", and in all votes by which the City Council expresses opinions, principals, facts or purposes, the form shall be, "Resolved."

Rule 38. Every ordinance and every order, resolution or vote shall after its passage remain in the possession of the City Clerk for forty-eight (48) hours after the day of meeting for the purpose of giving any Councillor an oppoprtunity to file notice of his or her intention to move reconsideration.

Amendment and Suspension

Rule 39. None of the foregoing rules and orders shall be suspended at any meeting unless two-thirds of all the members of the Council consent thereto.

No action is to be taken on any propposed amendment to the rules until the next regular meeting after the amendment has been proposed.

None of the foregoing rules or orders shall be amended or repealed unless two-thirds of all the members of the Council consent thereto.

On all motions made regarding items considered by the City Council under a "suspension of the rules" that a written copy of that motion will be submitted by the Councillor to the City Clerk and the City Manager.

Public Documents and Inspection of Public Documents

Rule 40. That for all communications with the City Council, all documents will be available for public inspection except when such public inspection will:

- 1. Constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.
- Jeopardize the City's position or otherwise interfere with collective bargaining or litigation,
 - 3. Jeopardize effective law enforcement, or
- 4. Impede or jeopardize the effective operation of the City Government.

Application for Public Library Trustees

Rule 41. Applicants for Trustees of the Public Library shall submit their application no later than

Cushing's Law

Rule 42. The Council shall be governed by "Cushing's Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies" in all questions of parliamentary practice not provided for by special rules or orders.

Advertisement

Rule 43. Any motion to advertise shall not be deemed to have been approved unless such motion shall have received the same number of voters as is required to ordain the proposed Ordinance or Order.

Municipal Law

Votes Required:

- 1. For approval of budget-majority vote 6 votes. G.L.c, 44, section 32, WHR Charter Art. 5, section 5-2 (b).
- 2. For intra-departmental (within the same department) transfer of funds upon recommendation of City Manager and majority vote 6 votes, G.L.c.

- 44, section 33B, WHR Charter Art. 5, section 5-4.
- 3. For inter-department (from one department to another) transfer of funds upon recommendation of City Manager and 2/3 vote (8 votes) plus assent of departmental head from whose department funds are being transferred. G.L.c. 44, section 33B, WHR Charter Art. 5, section 5-4.
- 4. For transfer of one appropriation to another not between departments is a straight appropriation of money and requires a recommendation of City Manager and a majority vote 6 votes. G.L.c, 44, section 33B. WHR Charter Art. 5, section 5-4.
- 5. For approval of Loan Orders whether within or outside of the Debt Limit 2/3 vote 8 votes. G.L.c, 44, sections 7 and 8. Except debts for temporary loans outside the debt limit majority vote 6 votes. G.L.c. 44, section 8.
- 6. For approval of appropriation for purchase or taking of land or any other interest therein, 2/3 vote 8 votes. G.L.c. 40, section 14, WHR Charter Art. 5, section 5-6.
- 7. For acceptance of statute, a majority vote 6 votes. G.L.c. 4, section 4, WHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-6 (b). Unless otherwise provided in the statute. G.L.c. 4, section 4.

- 8. For adoption of an ordinance majority vote 6 votes. WHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-6 (b). Emergency preamble requires 2/3 votes. WHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-9 (a).
- 9. For decreeing of a public street majority vote 6 votes. HWHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-6 (b). But such orders usually carry an appropriation for such taking under G.L.c. 40, section 14 and therefore paragraph 6, above applies.
- 10. For construction order, streets, sewer, etc. majority vote 6 votes. WHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-6 (b).

11. For passage of original zoning ordinance or

- change of zoning ordinance 2/3 vote 8 votes. G.L.c. 40A, section 5. WHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-6 (b). If written protest, stating the reasons, is filed with the City Clerk prior to final action by the Council, and is duly signed by owners of at least 20% of the area of the land proposed to be included in the change or of the area of the land immediately adjacent extending 300 feet therefrom, then 3/4 of the entire Council 9 votes are required. G.L.c. 40A, section 5. WHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-6 (b).
- 12. For increase of pension under G.L.c 32, section 90A 2/3 vote 8 votes. G.L.c. 32, section 90A. WHR Charter Art. 2, 2-6 (b).

- 13. For increase in salary or wage 2/3 vote 8 votes. G.L.c. 44, section 33A. WHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-6 (b).
- 14. To add a street to the Official Map, 2/3 vote 8 votes, unless Planning Board after hearing, has approved, then majority vote 6 votes. G.L.c. 41, section 81F. WHR Charter Art. 2, section 2-6(b).
- 15. Worcester Home Rule Charter, Section 2-9 Ordinances and Other Measures, (b) Measures. On the first occasion that the question of adopting any measure is put to the City Council, except an emergency measure as defined in section 2-9(a), if a single member objects to the taking of a vote, the vote shall be postponed until the next regular or special meeting of the City Council. If when the matter is next taken up for a vote, four or more members object to the taking of the vote, the matter shall be further postponed for not less than an additional five days. This procedure shall not be used more than once for any measure, notwithstanding any amendment made to the original measure.
